On the coach ride to Two Rivers we'll meet artist Tony Drehfal. Tony worked as a photographer for 35 years at Waukesha County Technical College, while consistently working in art using different mediums. He recently has taken early retirement to commit himself fully to wood engraving. Tony has been making engravings since 2002, after taking an introductory class with Jim Horton, the chief founder of the Wood Engravers' Network (WEN). Inspired by the lakes and woodland landscape of northern Wisconsin, Minnesota and Canada, Tony uses wood engraving to portray the intricate detail of the natural world. Tony presently serves on Wood Engraver's Network leadership team, which is now in the process of partnering with the Hamilton Wood Type & Printing Museum to create a wood engraving exhibit, classroom & library space within their Two Rivers museum.

10:30 ----Arrive at **Still Bend, the Schwartz House**

The Bernard Schwartz House, also known as Still Bend, is a Frank Lloyd Wright designed house in Two Rivers, Wisconsin. It is considered to be Wright's Life magazine "Dream House". Wright originally developed the design for the house for Life in 1938. The Schwartz House is one of the few Wright homes that allow guests to spend the night. (NO....Maybe another trip!! We are; however, going to have lunch there. So, that's something!)

1:00 PM----Hamilton Wood Block Print Museum

The Hamilton Wood Type and Printing Museum was founded in 2000. The museum is run by the Two Rivers Historical Society. It is dedicated to the preservation, study, production, and printing of wood type used in letterpress printing. The museum is in a

factory building of the Hamilton Manufacturing Company founded in 1880 by J.E. Hamilton. The museum has a collection of over 1.5 million pieces in more than 1,000 styles of wood type. Also included are presses and vintage prints.
